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Reporting In – Our Campaign for a Permanent Library

We have four years left on our lease on the building on Echo Avenue that houses the Piedmont Avenue Branch Library. That's about how much time it will take to secure a permanent home – all things considered – and we have started.

Our five teams have begun their research. The **Finance Committee** has submitted a substantial list of insightful questions to OPL's fiscal Officer. For example, they asked what funding is available to help us in the planning and development phase and what funding is available to help build a new library – matching funds, grants, etc. The **Development Committee** has researched the use of the parking lot near CVS, the **Political Committee** has contacted Councilperson Kalb, the **Site Committee**, will contact the Oakland Unified School District Facilities Department to ask about their plans for the now-abandoned Piedmont Avenue Early Childhood Development Center property that sits next to the library. The **Outreach Committee** will be present at the Halloween parade to distribute our colorful buttons and literature.

Our neighborhood is rich in experienced, talented activists! Join us - contact@fopabl.org. Together we will gather information and prepare a report to the neighborhood in January 2019. Well informed, we can decide the next step to secure a permanent home for our library.

Storytime And Other Library Activities Help Build Reading Skills And More

Phonological awareness – that's what you're looking for when you take your child to storytime, isn't it? Well, sure.

Public libraries offer a variety of fun and entertaining activities for infants and toddlers that promote early reading skills, such as open-ended creative playtime with blocks or puzzles. And storytime, of course.

Phonological awareness is recognition of spoken words, sounds and syllables, often learned through rhyming books and songs such as those highlighted during storytime. Talking, singing, reading, writing and playing are common parts of early reading activities.

The Book Worm Recommends

Red Sparrow by Jason Matthews

Forbidden Passion: A Plot Twist that Always Satisfies

The book opens with an American CIA agent crisscrossing snowy streets and alleys in Moscow as he meets and then saves a saintly “mole” who works deep within Russian intelligence. The description of his maneuvers as he hides, changes directions, outsmarts his pursuers, and even uses a reversible coat, are the stuff of which good spy novels are made.

Then this dedicated young American meets a beautiful but disillusioned Russian female spy! Each of these young people is assigned by their own national intelligence agency to befriend the other as a way of gathering vital, top secret information. Will they be able to seduce each other? If so, what happens then? And what about the admirable, elderly mole who badly needs protection while the two of them are busy?

The author, a long time CIA agent, excels at describing secret intelligence actions and strategies in cinematic terms that we can all envision. The two spies perform a slow circling dance which is described in terms of espionage tradecraft. Bumbling American CIA and FBI operatives step on each other's operations so that they can take credit for success and bumbling Russian operatives sabotage each other's efforts so that they can avoid blame.

There's plenty more where this came from. The book has been made into a movie starring Jennifer Lawrence and the author plans two sequels--*Palace of Treason* and the *Kremlin's Candidate*. With all this narrative riding on them, it is unlikely that this couple will settle down soon.
